

Sabbath and Sabbatical Rest

"On the sixth day God finished the work that he had done, and he rested on the seventh day from all the work that he had done. So, God blessed the seventh day and hallowed it, because on it God rested from all the work that he had done in creation."

These short verses at the beginning of the Bible set the stage for a practice among the Hebrew people called the sabbath. In the Jewish tradition sabbath begins on Friday night and goes until Saturday evening. Christians moved the sabbath to Sunday as a way to honor the resurrection of Jesus.

Whether the sabbath is practiced among Jews or Christians they share the same values of rest and worship of God. The sabbath is a day we dedicate to the Lord. It is a time of rest, so that we learn to trust God with our lives and so that we also embrace our need to slow down, pray, and enjoy the gift of connection with those closest to us. Sabbatical is an extended time of rest inspired by the weekly practice of the sabbath.

I hope the remainder of this spring and the summer will provide some needed rest and relaxation for all of us. May this season when the weather is especially nice in Oregon help us enjoy God, God's creation, and one another. On May 12th, Mother's Day, I am going to share more details about my plans for the summer. Our family will be doing some traveling, but will also be intentionally living here in Newberg in a relaxed way. Please be in prayer for me and my family this summer and I will be praying for you.

The Creative Love of Jesus

The past few weeks at Tierra Nueva we have been exploring creative ways Jesus is likened and referred to in the Bible, and what that means to us as followers of Jesus's way.

We talked about Jesus as the light of the world and how we are the light of the world, Jesus as living water and how that living water flows in and through us, and the love of God that is poured out to us through Jesus, and how we can share that love with those around us. After each time of teaching we have done an activation. To represent the light of the world, we engaged in a candle lighting; for living water, everyone did a visual art piece; and for God's love, we wrote a special card to someone to share God's love with them.

As we engaged in these creative acts, I was reminded of how God is still creating in this world and in each of us. The creative love of Jesus has transformed and empowered people in ways that are unique to each person and their stories. I think of dear ones in the Tierra Nueva faith community to whom God's love has been shown by the healing of body and mind. There are others, no less loved, who have been given strength to walk through difficult situations, and how the ever present love of God has never left their side.

During prayer time, people are invited to share what they are thankful for, and share things for which they need prayer. We are seeing answered prayers in ways that we could not have imagined, and the creative love and provision of Jesus is apparent. We also continue to pray for needs that have not yet been met, mourn collectively for losses, and the love of God is in the midst of being together in sorrow, grief and suffering.

Every week, brothers and sisters, weary from life, walk through the doors of our TN building to find rest and peace in a place where they are welcomed and included. After the service, we often eat meals together, always making room at the table, sharing God's love freely, as it has been freely given to us. The creative love of Jesus is tangible in the conversation and connection in the midst of our meeting and fellowship. That is God's love at work, wrapping often battle-scarred people in love and community.

When we did the visual art activity, it was messy, some people were unsure of the process, and each person's creation was vastly different from all the others. Yet each one was beautiful, and we did them together. The creative love of God is transforming lives in these same ways. The process is messy at times, and as we go through life, sometimes we are unsure of what is to come, and everyone has different needs and desires for their unique situation. God is creating something beautiful in each and every person. God's love is creating and transforming us in vastly different ways. We respect and celebrate the differences and diverse ways God is at work in our lives. We



are invited to walk alongside God and each other through a things that can be messy and unexpected, but as we surrender our lives, our hurts, and our burdens, we can trust God and experience God's creative love uniquely transforming each of us each step of the way.

Please be praying for teams going to the world in March to South Africa (Phil, staff care trip to our long term partnership team); Albania (preparation trip for Karen, who plans to serve there long term, 2 possible team members going too); South Asia (Casey and Trinity, Volleyball); Florence, Italy (Lee); Caribbean (Austin); Zagreb, Croatia (Brooke); San Juan, Puerto Rico (Mindy); Rome, Italy (Ivey); Argentina (Tim and Ted, Baseball, invited by national leaders to run leadership camps in the future); Torino, Italy (Jamie & Luke, establishing a long term partnership with national staff). The people mentioned are leading those trips, others are going with them. Pray for the Lord to guide for knowing where each place/people are in the process of building multiplying disciples, how to partner well and honor local leaders, that they would be filled with the Spirit and humble as they lead.

Discerning Conversations

We have been finding ourselves in conversations helping staff relate well with others with whom they have disagreement. We have been reminding them of things they learned in their new staff Bible classes: the distinction of beliefs on a conviction level (primary beliefs concerning salvation) and persuasions or opinions (secondary beliefs we may have values or preferences that are different, but we can love and serve alongside one another). Regardless of differences, pray that we will live out a healthy and gracious posture toward people. Pray for us as these conversations can be emotionally draining and sometimes come at unplanned times. Some of the questions that have been helping us process with people:

• What do I agree with? What do I disagree with? Does it line up with the God's word?

avoid thinking someone is all good or all bad?

How do I process this? Who can help me? If this disagreement is in a personal relationship, how can I express my thoughts, values and feelings in ways that move toward relationship and not isolation?

In these days and times, may Christ will be glorified and shine brightly through our staff as we humbly walk with the Lord and courageously proclaim the gospel. Thank you for your prayers and support.

Ato Markos had been worried that the men would grow weary and quit before trenching was done, but instead they threw themselves into the sira, showing up by flashlight to dig before going to their farms for the



day's tasks. They dug about five miles of trench for the pipes!

In their thank-you ceremony, the communities that MDC brought water to gave me a gift--a beautiful little heifer! People in the US all asked me, "What did you name her?" It made me laugh because I never once thought of naming her! The Dizi (dee-zee) people of Maji are cattle people. A cow is wealth, money in the bank--and a heifer is an interestbearing savings account! But I've named my cow now, to be more culturally appropriate here.

She is Shilamot, the word for a prize.

Shilamot has now been walked the 15 miles up the mountainside to the MDC office and guest house compound. She'll live a long and happy life there, I hope!

CARE TEAM MISSION STATEMENT

The Care Team is designed to nurture relationships with people who are no longer or rarely able to attend church. Contacts are made via phone calls, sending cards and visiting them.

The duties of a Care Team member are simple:

- Contact "clients" every two to three weeks. This can be done as described in the mission statement, or if you ascertain other ways of communication, that's fine. Make it clear that you are the main contact for church requests.
- At some point, send a card with your contact information in case they don't have a church directory
- If people need help, contact the Deacons. If they have prayer requests, you can pass those on to the "Pew News" or Chris for inclusion in the "Prayer Requests" part of the service.
- Some people will say they want to see Chris. The Care Team is designed to take a burden off Chris, as there is only so much of him to go around. But you can pass these requests along to Chris if it seems appropriate (end of life concerns etc.)



Are you interested in sending your child to a Christian camp this summer or attending college in the fall? Camp Tilikum is registering children for this summer right now! Our church has scholarship money available for FPC families who are interested in any of the summer camps available. Just contact Katherine in the church front office for an application.
